Outdoor Rec Infrastructure


The Skowhegan River Park will redevelop an industrial downtown river corridor into an accessible outdoor recreation asset with an expanded trail network and enhanced whitewater.

The river park will not only benefit community members through improved river access and free recreation opportunities, but it will also bolster the regional economy by attracting visitors, businesses, and new residents.



Skowhegan River Park

- A more welcoming riverfront in the heart of Skowhegan
- A riverfront promenade that will connect Skowhegan's historic downtown to the river and offer scenic river views
- Improved river access from both river banks
- Enhanced whitewater waves for kayaking, surfing, stand-up paddle boarding, and body boarding; infrastructure needed to host freestyle whitewater events
- Natural fish channel on river left for tubing
- Estimated 50 miles of four-season trails—including single track for mountain biking—accessible via downtown

Economic Development

The river park will increase spending locally and statewide by an anticipated \$6 million in the base year and up to \$19 million in year 10, which will in turn bolster wages and profits.

Economic Transformation Underway

- 7 Island Avenue: Bigelow Brewing, three floors of housing
- 151 Water Street: Renovated retail space, future AirBnB units
- 181 Water Street: Redeveloped community center with a pool for kayak rolling clinics
- 185 Water Street: Recently purchased, currently renovating
- 24 Court Street: Mixed-use development adjacent to Maine Grains that will expand the town's burgeoning food hub
- 31 Court Street: Recently renovated AirBnB units
- 7 Joyce Street: Property recently purchased to offer visitors short-term riverside accommodations
- Whit's End Grill & Bar (123 Madison Ave): Recently purchased; future home of new Brickyard Hollow location
- 65 Water Street: Recently purchased; future expanded home of our gear library and a new coffee shop

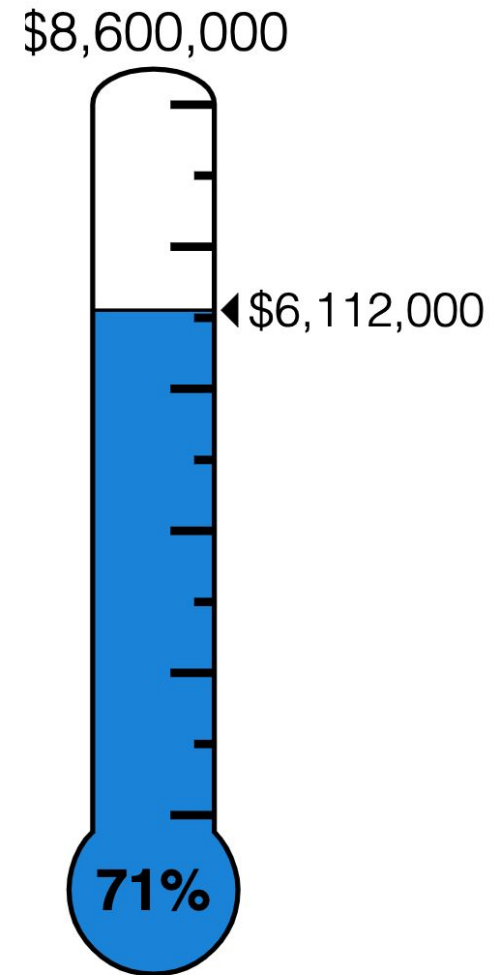

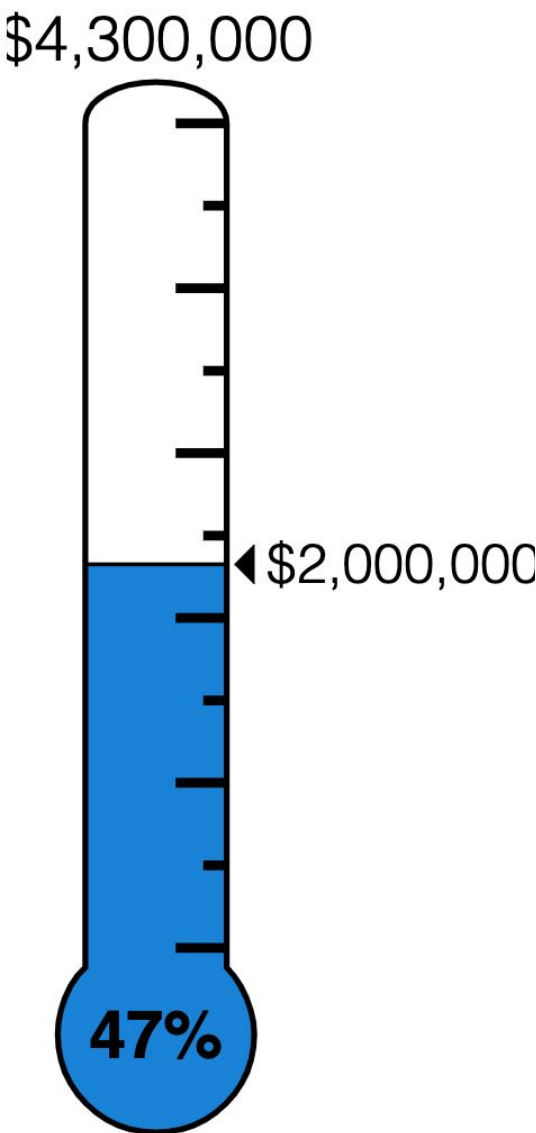
